MUSEUM'S CHANGES ALLOWS GUARDIANSHIP OF TAONGA

The Helensville Pioneer Museum was set up by the Helensville and Districts Historical Society to record Helensville's history. Helensville began with the arrival of the McLeod family but Te Awaroa existed well before that time. The pioneer history was easy to tell with a wonderful collection of local diaries, newspaper items, letters, photographs and artifacts available to help. But what about before the arrival of the McLeod family?

Recently the Museum's committee decided it was time to drop the word "Pioneer" from its title, become the Helensville Museum and to try to encompass local Maori history in its research and displays. With the recent move of the Archives collections and the Office to the new Archival building there are plans for the schoolhouse to have its display areas upgraded. So now is the perfect time to create a dedicated area telling Ngati Whatua's story.

For this to happen Maori, interest and involvement is needed. An approach was made to the kaumatua (elders) of Nga Maunga Whakahii o Kaipara asking for their support in creating a display and their verbal support was given. That support was quickly followed by something far more concrete and exciting.

In a significant and highly valued move, a pōwhiri held in November saw representatives from Haranui Marae's Ngāti Whātua iwi hand Helensville Museum a pou (carved post) to care for and display.

As Leigh has explained, carvings were often hidden in swamps to be kept safe when an iwi was under attack. It is thought the pou was probably put in the swamp when South Head Ngāti Whātua were attacked by the northern Ngāpuhi 300 - 400 years ago. While the swamp would have preserved the carving for the time it was buried, it was much more vulnerable when exposed to the elements. Sometime in the 1960s or early 1970s a carving emerged out of the swamps at Haranui. It was a magnificent pou. This taonga (treasure) was given the name Te Aroha and was kept at Haranui.

A decision to house the taonga in an environment better suited to its conservation, aligned well with the museum's request for a co-operative approach to a Maori display and the Helensville Museum was contacted to see if they would accept kaitiakitanga (guardianship) of Te Aroha. The huge significance of this offer was not lost on the museum personnel who hurriedly made preparations. Heta Tobin of Reweti accepted their plea to be kaumatua and guide the process of welcoming Te Aroha into the museum. Patron Gay Hildreth and senior member Gay Keane joined President John Smith and committee members to be the welcoming party. Local media and photographers were invited to attend.

Awa Hudson, from Haranui, brought Jim Wilcox, Lonny Bycroft and Glenn Wilcox through the museum's gates, her karanga (call) responding to that of Leigh Bosch. The magnificent

taonga was placed on the floor of the museum and unwrapped to muted sounds of awe. The true magnificence of Te Aroha was revealed.

In his whaikorero (speech) Heta Tobin reminded those present that the McLeod family were not the first people here and that with the arrival of this taonga a clear statement was made that Ngati Whatua was at last acknowledged and was in the house! President, John Smith, stated that he hoped it was the start of a much greater relationship with local iwi and shared his dreams of a small Maori village alongside the European buildings of the museum.

Glenn Wilcox gave the warnings of responsibility that come with the manaakitanga (care of mana) of such a taonga and reminded Leigh Bosch, who was appointed as kaitiaki (carer), of her responsibilities as a member of Ngati Whatua and who is, therefore, directly associated with Te Aroha. Leigh is also Vice-President of the Historical Society and a former Chair of the Reweti Marae Trust.

After the formalities, morning tea gave everyone the time to discuss the event and to reflect on the responsibilities and challenges it presented. It may be some months before Te Aroha is available for public viewing as he must first be cared for and prepared for his role as kaitiaki (guardian) of all who now come under his domain in Helensville Museum and as resident kaimanaaki (carer of the mana) of Ngati Whatua. The style of carving and decoration and other significant features of Te Aroha, will be described in a later article.

FAREWELL TO FRIENDS

MADGE BALDERSTON



Madge Balderston, who died recently aged 97 had lived in Helensville for 71 years, since she and her new husband arrived in 1944. Ethel Madge Healey married Dennis (Denny) Balderston in 1944. They boarded with the Williscrofts when they first came to Helensville. Later they bought their own home in Awaroa Road which remained the family home until Madge moved to Craigweil a few years ago.

Denny worked on the railways, at West Timber Company, a mill at Riverhead and at the Waitemata Electric Power Board. He died in 1981 aged 61 years.

Madge with her active interest in many local organizations truly earned the right to be called a dedicated citizen of Helensville. As well as following the interests of her son Eric and four daughters Brenda, Claire, Fay and Heather she was active in a number of organisations including the Red Cross, the Country Women's Institute, the Methodist Church, and later the South Kaipara Co-Operating Anglican-Methodist Parish (St Matthews) and the Historical Society.

Her interest and activities earned her Long Service Awards and Badges with the CWI and the Red Cross, including the Heart of Gold Community Award. For the Historical Society Madge was a regular on the Museum duty roster and a keen attender at Historical outings and functions.

Madge was a keen gardener and cook, and was interested in many crafts. She was a regular exhibitor at the Helensville A & P Show. It was her interest in and concern for helping people that persuaded her to keep going with Red Cross, even after the club membership had dwindled.

HERBERT FRANK HENLEY 1926 – 2015



Frank Henley was born in Kaukapakapa on 14th January 1926, the second child of Herbert Chaplin (Bert) and Bell Marguerite (nee Scott) Henley. With his siblings Mary and Arthur, he grew up in Henley House (originally known as 'The Poplars'), which their grandfather Morris Clark Henley, an early settler in Kaukapakapa, had built for his family in 1887.

Frank had a lifelong connection with Kaukapakapa and Henley House, and was proud in a humble way of the associated history. His Grandfather and two brothers had settled in the area and had had a strong influence

upon the community, donating land for various civic uses and participating in community life.

Educated at Kaukapakapa Primary School, with a brief stint at Helensville District High School, Frank didn't enjoy formal education, but had a lifelong love of learning, educating himself through reading, and practical learning, and displaying an interest in the wider world around him.

He held a number of jobs, including farming, supervisor with the Electricity Department, builder's labourer, and working in a timber treatment yard. During the war, and eager to serve the country he loved so much, he enlisted as soon as he was able in the New Zealand armed services – during the war in the Airforce, posted to the Solomon Islands, and then post war, with the Army in J-Force in Japan. Like his forebears, he was also involved in the Kaukapakapa community, and for a number of years was the sexton for the Methodist Church, as was his father before him.

In late 1966, Frank headed off to England on his OE. Prior to leaving New Zealand, his English born Auntie Beat Henley, had given him a list of people to contact, including the address of her niece and family. Frank visited the Wannells, falling in love with their daughter Joy, marrying her and bringing her back to the family home at Kaukapakapa. The birth of two children followed, Elizabeth and Christine (Chrissy). A few years later, they sold Henley House as it had become too much to maintain and built a new home nearby. They were fortunate enough to be able to continue their association with Henley House, with subsequent owners.

Frank had a strong faith in God, and out of this came a love for Israel and its people. He was an elder in the Helensville Baptist Church for several years. His beliefs coloured who he was and what he did.

In 2002, due to ongoing health issues, Frank and Joy moved to Orewa. Here they settled into a new phase of life in that community, making many friends, while retaining strong connections with Kaukapakapa. Over the past few years, Frank's memory began to fail and earlier this year, he moved into a rest home. He had further health problems, and was admitted to North Shore Hospital where he passed away, aged 89 on 8th November, having celebrated his 48th wedding anniversary two days prior.

FURTHER FAREWELLS

GUY SHANKS a longtime local resident, died recently, aged 97 at Cragweil, Parakai. Although not currently a member of the Historical Society we record Guy's death as a member of the well-known Kaukapakapa pioneer Shanks family and send our condolences to the family. There will be an opportunity to hear stories of the Shanks family at the May Winter Lecture (Sunday 15 May) when Bruce Shanks will be the speaker.

BEN CAPEDO was a dedicated member of the West Auckland Historical Society and had a great deal of knowledge of local history. Among his many other talents he operated the model of a kauri trip dam which is a popular feature of the Museum at Henderson. Ben died at the end of November and we extend our sympathy to his family and friends.

PAT BRADLY Sympathy and condolences are extended to the Bradley family on the death of Pat, a lifelong resident of Te Pua.
